Everything you ever wanted to know about Soltrans


Mandy Renshaw from SolTrans spoke to us at the Benicia Library. We learned about local bus travel. For instance, did you know that Sol Trans runs all the way from Walnut Creek BART up to UC/Davis and the Mondavi Center, and that another line goes from Vallejo over to the Ferry Building in San Francisco?

If you have difficulty accessing the regular bus or getting to a bus stop, you can call 707-541-7184 for information about SolTrans ADA Paratransit, which can take you to where you want to go or a bus stop. If you are over 80, you ride everywhere FREE! If you are (alas!) under 80, you can pay with a paper pass purchased for exact change on the bus or use a senior clipper card. And, what's more, you can call and get help with planning your route. Call customer service at 707-648-4666.

For travel in and around Benicia there is a subsidized LYFT program. Seniors pay \$4 (or \$3 if you qualify) for a one-way trip within Benicia. So, the most you will pay for roundtrip transportation to the store or to a local appointment is \$6 or \$8. For eligibility details, call 800-535-6883. Call that same number for medical trips "concierge services," which can include wheelchairaccessible vehicles. There is also guided travel training for one or a group to help you learn to use the bus. Sol Trans is committed to making sure our local seniors can get around even if they can't drive anymore. Give them a call and find out how you can get to where you want to go.

What is a Knoxbox?



Can the paramedics enter your locked home if you fall and can't get up, but can reach a phone to call 911?

If the Fire Department, with paramedics, receives a call for medical service, they are empowered to enter your home by any means and always have crowbars and battering rams to force entry. And what is a smashed door compared to receiving no medical aid for a life-threatening injury? However, there is an alternative.

The area fire departments of American Canyon, Benicia, and Vallejo have all approved a "secure key box" by the Knox company that will store your house key and allow the fire department to open it with a special key.

The Knox company offers both a residential box, which holds several keys, and a home box, which is designed for a single key. The residential box holds two keys and is about \$370, while the home box is about \$220. <u>https://www.knoxbox.com/Products/Residential-KnoxBoxes</u>

The Knoxbox is normally attached near the front of your home. Your local fire department may be able to offer advice on this matter. This writer attached it to the garage door frame, which is adjacent to the walkway to the front door.

After attaching the box and inserting the key, you can call the fire department, who will send somebody out to "lock" the box with their special key. They will also note the address in the Fire Department's database and report this to the 911 dispatch center. **Note**: you may shop for other such devices online or call the fire department and ask for their advice.
