CDS is a licensed Commercial Fundraiser, as recognized by the California State Attorney General’s Registry of Charitable Trusts.

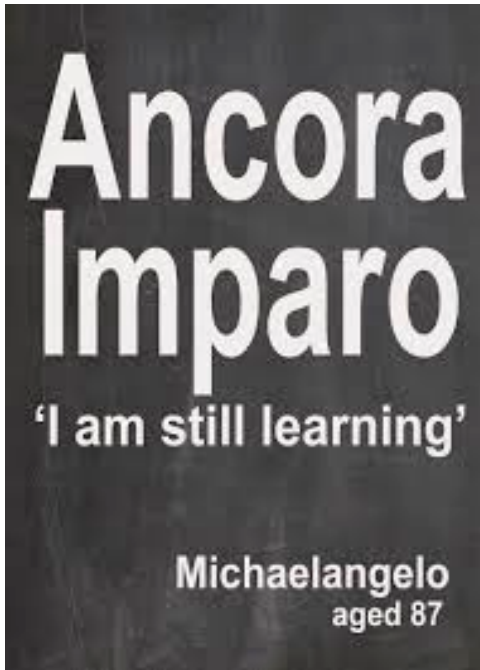

Last year, 20 of us enjoyed a fun-filled day being interviewed. Our participation is a valuable and welcome part of their training, and we have the satisfaction of contributing!

One of our members exclaimed, “It’s gratifying when you can have a young person give you their full attention and eye contact for 30 minutes and really be interested in what you have to say!”
